Winners of the ARSC Awards for Excellence

ARSC Conference, Nashville Tennessee

Winners of the 1997 ARSC Awards for Excellence in Historical Recorded Sound research were announced at the banquet concluding the 31st annual ARSC Conference, held in Nashville, Tennessee, May 1-3, 1997. The following winners were chosen by a blue ribbon panel from a large field of candidates representing the best record research published during 1996.

LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Frank Andrews

Frank Andrews is an English collector and writer who since the late 1960s has written extensively on acoustic-era labels and general phonograph history, especially in the U.K. Most of his work has been for the *Hillandale News* and the *Talking Machine Review*. He has authored more than one hundred articles, including detailed, multi-part corporate histories of English labels including Aeolian-Vocalion, Edison Bell, Imperial, Zonophone and Homophone, as well as many small independent and "store"

labels of the early 1900s. Among his monographs are Columbia 10" Records 1904-30 (City of London Phonograph and Gramophone Society, 1985) and The Edison Phonograph, the British Connection (City of London Phonograph and Gramophone Society, 1986). His article "Pathe Records in Britain" (with Len Watts) was a finalist for a 1992 ARSC Award for Excellence.

Upon being notified of his award, Mr. Andrews taped a message to the members of ARSC which was played at the Awards Banquet in Nashville. Following is an excerpt:

"Greetings to members of the ARSC. I've been informed by telephone, by your member Tim Brooks, that the Association is to present me with ARSC's 1997 Lifetime Achievement Award... This award has come as a complete surprise to me, unlooked for but most welcome. Goodness me! I'm in there with the greats like Jim Walsh, Ray Wile and Brian Rust. I have arrived!"

"I ventured into disc record and record company researching thirty years ago, at age 47, when I became a member of the City of London Phonograph and Gramophone Society, which had been founded by some devotees of Edison phonographic products in 1919. By the time I joined in 1967 it had become a preservation and historical society, its journal having begun only in 1960, during the demise of the 78 rpm record. There was little in print about the British talking machine industry as regards its history, especially as regards the makes of records and the companies that marketed them. Very few copies of catalogs were available. In attempting to produce a complete Jumbo Records catalog my research drew me into the whole of the early British market and industry. I commenced to write articles for Hillandale News and the later Talking Machine Review, for the interest of members and collectors in general. I wanted to confine myself to Britain but it soon became apparent that America and some European countries' industries had a big influx into the British market. And so my terms of reference for research had to include the foreign sources. The result is that the membership and readers outside of Britain often find something of interest in the subjects I have written about. It's been most enjoyable researching, sometimes frustrating, and very pleasant to see my articles in print and to present programs at our London monthly meetings. I repeat, I am extremely surprised and mightily pleased to become the recipient of your prestigious award, and I can promise you more articles to come. Thank you again, and I offer my best wishes to the ARSC."

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Those members who could not attend the 1997 conference missed a wonderful series of events. Program highlights included the appearance of the Fisk Jubilee Singers who "cut" a number of cylinders with the help of staff from the Edison National Site in New Jersey. And of course ARSC announced the recipients of the annual Awards for Excellence. Especially moving was the response of Frank Andrews, who received the Lifetime Achievement Award and responded by tape recorded message with appreciation and amazement. Next year's annual conference will take place in Syracuse, New York on May 14-16, 1998.

The Board of Directors moved in a big way to begin implementing recommendations flowing from the strategic planning process. It endorsed several recommendations which will clearly strengthen ARSC in the future. Among them are the following:

A new Education and Training Committee was approved to develop programs that foster the spread of knowledge about such issues as collecting, archiving and preserving sound recordings.

A new Conference Committee, and the new position of Conference Manager, will strengthen the coordination of conference arrangements between the local committee and the association.

Upon the recommendation of Membership Committee Chairperson Wendy Sistrunk, the Board endorsed a comprehensive plan to increase ARSC membership.

The Membership Committee and the Publicity Committee were combined into a single entity, the Publicity and Membership Committee, with the current chairpersons serving as co-chairs.

In other actions the Board of Directors accepted the invitation from the University of California, Santa Barbara Libraries to hold the 1999 annual conference in Santa Barbara (dates have not been arranged yet), agreed to ask the President to pursue a possible joint conference with the International Association of Sound and Audiovisual Archives in 2001 or later, agreed to place links in the ARSC web site only to not-for-profit organizations, and agreed to purchase the ARSC domain name for its web site

And lastly, the proposal to increase the annual membership dues on a three year ladder failed (despite the belief of the President and many others at the time that it had passed). This action puts ARSC, and the Board of Directors, in a very challenging position. Responding in our usual positive manner, ARSC will be examining ways to reduce expenditures on the Directory (format and production more closely matched to the purpose of the Directory) and the Journal (bid the production of the Journal looking for a lower price without sacrificing quality). At its fall meeting in Syracuse, the Board of Directors will need to deal with the financial issue in very concrete terms.

New Conference Manager Appointed

The Board of Directors authorized the creation of the new position of Conference Manager. It is the good fortune of ARSC that John Knowles of the Country Music Foundation has accepted the appointment as the first occupant of this important office. John served as Local Arrangements Chairperson for the 1997 Nashville Conference and is experienced with such matters. His first assignment is to work with the local arrangements folks at Syracuse to assure a well planned and coordinated conference. Welcome John.

EDUCATION AND TRAINING COMMITTEE

At its spring meeting in Nashville, the Board of Directors authorized the creation of a new Education and Training Committee. The position of chair of this committee is now open and available. Candidates Sought For 1998 ARSC Awards

The Awards Committee requests your nominations for the 1998 ARSC Awards for Excellence. This is the highest honor (in fact, the only honor) presented in the field of historical recorded sound research, and past winners have expressed their gratitude for the recognition. The judges want to make sure that all good candidates are located, but they haven't seen everything. So please let them know what you think should be considered. If no one speaks up, a good book or article might be missed!

Anyone may propose a candidate. Following are the rules for eligibility (please read carefully):

- 1. The work must be a printed work and have been first published during calendar year 1997. This includes books, monographs, articles, and liner notes.
- 2. It must be on a subject related to recorded sound. This includes histories, artist biographies, and discographies in any field of music, speech or technology (classical, popular, rock, jazz, country, folk, spoken word, labels, phonographs, etc.). It also includes writing about modern techniques for the preservation or reproduction of older recordings.
- 3. The work must deal primarily with historical periods, defined as at least ten years prior to the year of publication (i.e., pre-1987). (Except for works on preservation or reproduction.)
- 4. In addition, nominees are invited for the Lifetime Achievement Award, which is presented to an individual in recognition of his or her life's work in recorded sound research. Candidates for this award should have had a substantial history of major publications.
- 5. Deadline for nominations: January 31, 1998.

SEARCHING FOR TCHAIKOVSKY WAX CYLINDER RECORDING

In 1893, A Mr. Block of St. Peterburg, made a Tchaikovsky recording. Block was an Edison enthusiast, but not an Edison representative in Europe. Allen Koenigsberg bought the Block collection at auction in the UK in 1992(?), including notes and 25 wax cyclinders from an estimated 300, but not Tchaikovsky. On the Block's inventory sheet Allen reads a penciled notation that the Tchaikovsky cyclinder is cracked. Apparently an afficiando in Japan has perfected a non-destructive laser playback system for wax cyclinders. Feasibly, the Tchaikovsky recording could be reconstructed digitally. ELLIS ISLAND IMMIGRATION MUSEUM WANTS INFORMATION ON EARLY SOUND RECORDINGS THAT DOCUMENT THE IMMIGRANT EXPERIENCE

Ellis Island Immigration Museum is presently gathering information for a discography about how immigrants and others viewed the immigrant experience during the time that Ellis Island operated as the largest immigration station in the United States (1892-1954). At this point the material seems to fall into two general categories and we are interested in both of them:

- 1. U.S. sound recordings made by immigrants in their native language that comment either directly of indirectly (e.g. the use of English words in a traditional song) on the plight of the immigrant.
- 2. Sound recordings made by people such as Billy Murray, Steve Porter, and Joe Hayman which either are based upon ethnic stereotypes or incorporate some aspect of an ethnic stereotype in a skit or a song including the use of an ethnic phrase or slur.

We are trying to find out as much as possible about these recordings. Consequently, we would greatly appreciate any information you may have, including lists of performers, titles, catalogue/matrix numbers, translations, and histories of works, authors, and performers. We are also extremely interested in knowing what recordings were paired with these works on double-sided discs. Finally, we are looking for volunteers who may wish to help us put this discography together.
