- B. Individual sound archives and their collections [The Standards Committee recommends that ARSC should have a separate publicity committee to handle news of the activities of the Association as a whole and of individual collections. This is made as a proposal for future consideration of the Association.]
- V. The publication of an official organ to the extent that its content might be useful as a vehicle for the promotion of standards. The publication of the organ itself, as well as the publication of monographic series or a union catalog, should be for the consideration of the Publications Committee. [The <u>Journal</u> has become the official organ. Another publication of ARSC is its Bulletin.]

There will probably be a need for more work by the Standards Committee later as the Association grows.
