J. Peter Bergman is a playwright and the co-author of *The Films of Jeannette MacDonald and Nelson Eddy*. After ten years with the Rodgers and Hammerstein Archives of Recorded Sound he free-lanced as a journalist, spent three years with CBS News, and has headed up his own Cruise-Travel agency in New York. A former Vice-President of ARSC, he was responsible for the first *ARSC Directory* and has reviewed vernacular materials for the *Journal* and other publications since 1968. He is currently an Associate at Thea Dispeker Inc. Artist's Representatives.

Tim Brooks is Vice President, Research for the USA cable network in New York. He has written numerous articles and books on television and the history of the recording industry. He compiles the Current Bibliography listing for the ARSC Journal.

Paul Charosh is a member of the Sociology faculty of Brooklyn College, collects nineteenth century recordings, and writes on the history of vernacular music in America. His most recent article, "'Classical' and 'Popular' in the Mid-Nineteenth Century" appears in the summer 1992 issue of American Music.

Jeffrey Earnest is Head of Music Technical Services at the Stanford University Music Library. A member of ARSC, he is also active in the Music Library Association on matters of music cataloging. James Fisher is Associate Profesor of Theatre at Wabash College. He is currently at work on a biobibliography of Al Jolson, and has previously contributed review essays on a set of Judy Garland recordings and a Smithsonian Collection of musical theatre recordings to the ARSC Journal. Anthologies of Cuban, Peurto Reican, Trinidadian and bagpipe music will appear on Heritage in England.

Gilles St.-Laurent studied at the Music Industry Arts Program for a degree in recording engineering. He has worked at A&M Records, the Performing Rights Organization, and is currently at the National Library of Canada. He is a member of IASA.

John Swan is Head Librarian at Bennington College. He has written extensively in the areas of intellectual freedom, library sciience, and the theatre, as well as classical music recordings.

J. F. Weber is the early music reviewer for *Fanfare*. He has written for the *ARSC Journal* for many years and has held a number of offices in ARSC. He is currently the chairperson of the ARSC Publications Committee.

Keith D. Wilcox is a musicologist and a DMA candidate at the University of Missouri-Kansas City. In addition to currently working in the Music Library of UMKC, he is also an avid collector of classical music.
