Chuck Haddix performed his responsibilities with delicate veracity, and served ARSC and *ARSC Journal* readers well. The members of the editorial board, the editorial advisory board, authors, reviewers, and numerous others deserve great credit for the quality and accomplishments of the *Journal*. When things have gone wrong, it has been my fault.

ARSC is really quite an extraordinary organization to work for. As editor I received help when I needed it, and freedom of action and decision at all other times. Unquestionably, critical comments have been received, critical in the best sense of the word. They have made the *ARSC Journal* better.

Barry Ashpole now assumes the editorship. In his able hands, great things will happen. Support him by writing, reviewing, and helping with the *Journal*. The *ARSC Journal* is only as good as the members of the Association make it. For the next year or so, I will move to the chair of the ARSC Publications Committee. In that capacity, I hope to strongly support the work of Barry, David Summerfield, Jim Farrington, and the officers and members of ARSC.

Recently, I was reminded of one of those great quotations uttered by Yogi Berra. "When you come to a fork in the road, take it." I'm going to do just that right now.
