Belle Davis and Her Piccaninnies: a Preliminary Bio-, Disco-, and Filmography

Belle Davis was an Afro-American song and dance artist, entertainer, choreographer, and director. She was a recording pioneer who toured Europe extensively during the period 1901-1929. Not only did she record on disc as early as 1902, she also performed in front of a movie camera at least twice during the early years of this century. In spite of these extraordinary achievements, little has been written about her; her biography, her discography and her filmography remain sketchy.

Belle Davis shares the fate of many American performers who chose to pursue their career overseas and consequently tended to be overlooked by researchers and historians at home. As an example, there is no entry for her in *Biographical Dictionary of African and Afro-American Musicians* (Southern, 1982).¹ Afro-American trumpeter Arthur Briggs, who came to England in 1919 as a member of Will Marion Cook's Southern Syncopated Orchestra, met Belle Davis in Europe. Briggs describes her as a dancer-organizer with the authorization of the American Government to train and stage teenagers' shows. Pickaninny shows were often used by unscrupulous operators to exploit orphans, but Briggs made it clear that Davis was different.² In 1901 she took a piccaninny group to Europe which included Irving 'Sneeze' Williams (age 9), and Fernandes 'Sonny' Jones (age 7). In later years her troupe included Walter Humphrey, Louis Douglas, Archie Ware, and possibly Harry Flemming. According to English-born Black entertainer Gordon Stretton, Belle Davis 'was a mezzo-soprano; tall black girl, native from New Orleans, very beautiful... The piccaninnies used to tap-dance and play harmonica.'³ By other accounts, Belle Davis was light-complexioned and it is said that in the U.S.A. it was not uncommon for booking agents to encourage Miss Davis to "darken dow."⁴ Her photograph on sheet music bears this out and made serious researchers believe that she was white.

Although I have been unable to locate Davis' birth certificate, and although I have not seen an obituary, it seems reasonable to deduce from other evidence that she was born in New Orleans, Louisiana, between June 1873 and September 1874. She was last heard of in Paris, France, in 1929 and may have died there. In Europe her name was often spelled Davies, with an "e." As there were several other Afro-American song-and-dance performers of similar spelling in turn-of-the-century Europe, there is a danger of confusion. In particular she should not be confused with Ma Belle Davies, who toured Europe in partnership with Chas. Hooker as "Hooker & Davis."

When Belle Davis first visited Europe in 1901 she was already 27 years of age

and could look back on a long and varied professional career. She was known as the "Queen of ragtime singers" and the important music publisher E.B. Marks remembered her as a "coon shouter."⁵ She was a member of Sam T. Jack's *The Creole Show* (1891), alongside Chas. Johnson, Dora Dean, Mattie Wilkes, Bob Cole, and other famous black performers. The advance man of this show was John W. Isham, who organized his own Octoroons in 1896(?). By 1897(?) the popularity of this company had become so great that Isham put out two additional companies of "Octoroons." The original cast included Belle Davis. During 1896/97 the cast also included Mattie Wilkes, Inez Clough, J. Rosamond Johnson, Strut Payne, and The Hyer Sisters. "Among the many features of the great show were ... the maids of the Oriental Huzzars, led by Miss Belle Davis ... Miss Belle Davis gave a pleasing imitation of May Irwin in 'I Want You, Ma Honey' and other popular songs."⁶ Davis, a Black, was thus praised for imitating a white singer imitating Blacks as conceived by white tunesmiths ...

After Isham's retirement, the last Octoroons company continued "under the management of Will Isham, starring Billy Kersands in a farcical vaudeville comedy entitled *King Rastus*, with the Mallory Bros. and Brooks, and Smart and Williams as features, with scenery owned by Miss Belle Davis, who later foreclosed on the company because of nonpayment on the scenery and closed the show."⁷

Davis was one of the principal persons in the transition from the operatic to the ragtime finale. She had moved from a position of an ordinary singer in the 1896 production of the Octoroons to a full fledged vocalist of the new rag art. By 1899 she had also toured on her own and appeared at the New York Venetian Terrace with four pic-

caninnies. In the 1900 Octoroon program of *Seven-Eleven-Seventy-Seven*, she concluded a performance of 'Thirty Minutes Around The Opera' with 'Oh, Listen To The Band.' However, the black music critic Alex Rogers reviewed the program and pointed out Miss Davis' inability to deliver. He found her singing quite unsatisfactory and the opera scenes "butchered."⁸

For her European adventure in 1901 she selected Sneeze Williams, age 9, and Sonny Jones, age 7, both of whom continued a career as jazz musicians in 1920s Europe, as members of the International Five. In Vienna in 1904 Davis toured with three juveniles. Although one of Davis' 1907 silent movies was advertised as "Belle Davis and her three Negroes," only two youngsters can be seen cajoling about. A fourth child was with the troupe in 1909.

It has been claimed that, in 1902, Belle Davis married Eddie Whaley, of the famous Scott & Whaley comedy team, forerunners of the Williams & Walker team. I have found no evidence to support this.⁹ In June 1904 Belle Davis married Troy Floyd. According to Afro-American musician/composer Perry Bradford, Belle Davis was Henry Troy's first wife. As a singer and actor, Troy was in the cast of *In Dahomey* (1903), *Rufus Rastus* (1906), *Bandanna Land* (1908), *Mr Lode of Koal* (1909), *Dr Beans From Boston* (1912), and *The Frog Follies* (1913). He also provided the book for *Darkydom* (1915).¹⁰ The marriage certificate, located by researcher Howard Rye, describes Davis as a spinster.¹¹ However, Davis did marry Whaley at an unknown later date. When she arrived from New York City at Southampton in 1919 the passenger list included Whaley, Belle, artist, aged 45.¹²

Davis continued to tour Europe until at least December 1917, although she appeared only in Britain during the war years. She then went home to the U.S.A. (in 1918?) and returned after the war, in 1919, but presently nothing is known about her activities at that time. Between about 1925 and 1929 Belle Davis became choreographer at the prestigious Casino de Paris, and was responsible for the annual revues. Curiously, this position was later (during the 1936/37 season) held by another Afro-American – Louis Douglas.¹³

The following chronology is an attempt to document the known movements of Belle Davis in Europe. It presents: a) the dates of her appearances (European style: DD/MM/YY, thus 10.06.01 would mean June 10th, 1901); b) the city (most place names are spelt in the language of the respective country, e.g., Wien instead of Vienna); c) the venue (the word "theater" has been omitted in most cases, e.g., Apollo means Apollo Theater); d) the billing (mostly in English translation); e) selected contemporary reviews (with sources in square brackets []). Whenever quotation marks are used (" ") spelling and punctuation are preserved as in original.

It should be borne in mind that many of the details listed below are vague, unconfirmed, or tentative, and it is hoped that readers will be motivated to check any contemporary sources available to them for further details and confirmation. Indeed, the chronology is meant as a research tool to provide future researchers with clues about where to look for reviews which might contain relevant information. The main sources for the information presented in this essay are English language theatrical papers researched by Howard Rye, and German language theatrical papers researched by myself. With the exception of Berliner 3244 and Gramophone Concert Record GC-3273, which are in my possession, the other recordings listed were not available for visual or aural inspection. The two movie films have been rediscovered and an attempt was made to have them partly restored.

The olio: Belle Davis, Smart and Williams, comedians; The Brittons, buck and wing dancers; William Mozambique English, negro songs; and Billy Miller, monologist. As a closing number, the entire troupe is seen in the operetta 'Thirty Minutes Around the Opera'" (*New York Clipper*, 05.05.00).

- Both films were shot in front of the same backdrops. The first was advertised in Germany in February 1907 as a "Naturaufnahme," the latter was advertised in Germany as late as February 1911. One of the three boys also appears dressed as a girl to perform a cakewalk parody with another boy dressed in high hat and tails. There is a remarkable similarity in dress and appearance between these two and a girl and boy depicted on a series of 10 French postcards entitled simply "Le Cake-Walk. Dansé au Nouveau Cirque. Les Enfants Nègres." The earliest postmark found on this series of cards is 31.05.1903. The same pair is also shown on a different postcard which bears the information "Prime du journal 'Le Sans-Souci.'" I have been unable to identify this source for verification. It is thus possible that Belle Davis and her Piccaninnies performed at the Nouveau Cirque, Paris, at some date prior to May 1903.
