Armitage, Andrew D. and Dean Tudor. Annual Index to Popular Music Record Reviews, 1972. Metuchen, N.J., Scarecrow Press, 1973. 467p. LC 73-8909.

This is the first volume of an annual work indexing 35 magazines ranging from <u>Creem</u> to <u>Stereo</u> <u>Review</u> to <u>Ethnomusicology</u>. The work has reviews in 12 categories and appendices of significant new books and articles on music, plus a list of record manufacturers, distributors, and specialty record stores.

Cnattingius, Claes M. <u>Preliminary International Bibliography of Discographies and Record Catalogues</u>. 27p. plus 16 unnumbered pages, in typescript.

This work was brought together under the auspices of AIBM Phonotheque Commission and IASA. There are five main sections plus two lists; one containing addresses of record companies in the Schwann catalog, and one of manufacturers not listed in Schwann. The work in hand is tentative. Recordings and Collections

The Country Music Foundation Library, Nashville, reports receiving 19,000 records in three collections: a collection of 4,000 records from former talent manager Hubert Long; RadiOzard Enterprises of Springfield, Mo., donated almost complete sets of their various transcribed radio series of the 1940's and 1950's--the gift also included nearly 100 of the ABC-TV "Ozark Jubilee" show scripts from 1957-1959; and lastly, a vast private collection of Connie Hall.

A TV Commercials archive is being established at the University of Arizona. Leading ad agencies as J. Walter Thompson, N. W. Ayer, Doyle Dane Bernbach and

many others have already provided TV commercials going back to the 1950's. The collection is under the supervision of Leslie Daniels, a former advertising copywriter who is a lecturer at the university's College of Business Administration.

The TV News Archive at Vanderbilt University is being sued by CBS regarding the taping of news programs--mean-while, CBS has arranged an agreement whereby the tax-payers foot the bill via the National Archives audio-visual center, administered by James Moore. The actual taping is being done by the Army audiovisual services for the National Archives, and the pilot program is up for renewal consideration in June.

<u>Voices on Tape</u>, is a 64 page catalog of products by Jeffrey Norton Publishers, Inc., 145 E. 49th St., N.Y.C., 10017. It has a subject/author index of over 1,000 tapes and includes the McGraw Hill "Sound Seminars" recently acquired by JNP and "Seminar Cassettes" from England.
