"THE GOLDEN AGE OF LATIN MUSIC"

Presented by

GILDA MIRÓS

Focusing on Latino premier artists and composers from Puerto Rico, Cuba, Colombia and the Dominican Republic who were popular in New York from 1930 to 1990, and based on interviews recorded and preserved by Mirós during her more than two decades as host of the top-rated Spanish language radio program in New York City and Miami. She will share memories of Tito Puente, Cecilia Cruz, Bobby Capó, Flor Morales, the Puerto Rican troubadour "Ramito," La Lupe, Esther Forero's Cumbias, Machito's Afro-Cuban music, Maso Rivera's cuatros, Rafael Hernandez's story and Boleros, Dioris Valladares Merengues and Don Azpiazu's Rumba arrival on Broadway in 1930. It's oral history with plentiful humor, insightful anecdotes, and nostalgic music.

Gilda Mirós, actress, author and broadcaster, has appeared in film, theater, and television in Mexico, Puerto Rico and North America. She was the first Latina radio personality with a daily four-hour show, transmitted via satellite between Miami, Los Angeles and New York. Materials from career as a NYC-based broadcaster were recently added to the national collections at the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History in Washington, D. C. She is a peer mentor of the Actors Fund Performing Arts Legacy Project. Her books include Celia Cruz and Sonora Metancera (2003), A Portrait of Puerto Rico (2005), and a bilingual children's book, Hortense and Her Happy Ducklings (2006), coauthored with her mother, Montserrate. She also has recorded two audiobooks, De La Montaña Venimos/Iconos Latinoamericanos (2014) and Poetisas de Hispanoamerica (2016). She currently produces and hosts the Cable TV/Streaming, NYbased, television series "Latin Icons-Past & Present" at Manhattan Neighborhood Network, since 2016. Her Podcast presenting bilingual vintage oral history interviews with Latino Icons of the past & present is available on many platforms. She recently won a Hometown Media National Award 2019, for her documentary "Seniors Finally Say#MeToo." In 2017, Mirós received a star along the Walk of Fame at Union City, NJ's Cecilia Cruz Plaza, named after the legendary "Queen of Salsa."
